Building on our recycling record

Question 1: Are the suggested actions the best way to help us recycle more?

Electrical Safety First is the only UK charity that seeks to prevent fires and incidents in people's homes in Wales caused by electrical sources of ignition. Electrical Safety First is interested in providing evidence to the Welsh Government's consultation on 'A Circular Economy' because of the increasing recycling and reselling of electrical goods including white good appliances by councils in Wales.

We support the Welsh Government's approach on better collection of electrical goods. Electrical goods in Wales are now being increasingly recycled - whether this is the breaking down of electrical items to components to be recycled or electrical goods being re-sold by councils as a complete unit.

Electrical Safety First supports the re-sale of electrical goods, but it needs to be done in a safe way and we have some concerns on whether adequate checking of electrical goods in Wales is undertaken prior to items being sold.

We do not believe local government recycling in Wales, generally follows good practice, particularly in relation to items being suitably inspected and tested, and checked as to whether they are subject to a recall notice. We believe that there is work needed to be undertaken to improve this policy area.

We would like to offer to work with the Welsh Government and local councils to ensure that the collection of this waste and how it is being processed is following stricter guidelines, including guidance on what should and what should not be recycled.

Question 2: Should recycling arrangements across Wales be consistent?

For electrical (WEEE) waste there needs to be a pan-Wales approach – our analysis shows there is great inconsistency across Wales in terms of WEEE. Our key points of note to the Welsh Government are: -

- All councils offer a service for WEEE waste to be recycled which is very welcome news.
- How WEEE waste is collected: i.e. citizens need to transport the items themselves to the civil amenity sites vs collections at the kerbside. Currently, as we understand there are **zero** 'amenity bins' in Welsh neighbourhoods nor any kerbside collections of WEEE waste to improve recycling of it.
- Only a minority of Welsh Councils (6 at the time of writing) offered re-sales of electrical goods.
- Only **2** councils who re-sold electrical goods stated they checked for safety and recalls this is particularly worrying that electrical goods could be being sold that are subject to a recall. Electrical Safety First believes there needs to be much greater consistency on this and the organisation is willing to help local authorities through the WLGA support the drafting of guidance.
- **1** council when asked was unable to provide any information, nor were aware, on whether items were subject to safety tests or recall checking we were referred to their contractor. There appears to be a lack of understanding in some councils on their legal obligations on passing on recalled goods whether to the public or a third party.
- Only **13** councils in Wales had information on their website on WEEE recycling. None of the councils had information for consumers on whether their items could be resold or offered items for re-sale. Communications with the public and transparency is very inconsistent.

Electrical Safety First believes that these are areas of policy that the Welsh Government will need to work with local authorities in Wales to provide better consistency. Given the Charity's expertise in this policy area- we would welcome being part of this process.

Question 3: Are the suggested actions in this theme (Building on our recycling record) the right ones? If not, why? What other actions could we consider to achieve the aims of the strategy?

Electrical Safety First supports local authorities in Wales re-selling 'appropriate, safe and checked for recall' electrical goods. Local authorities can help prevent the sales of such items on online marketplaces as the public see them in a similar way to charities, as a trusted organisation from which to make such a purchase.

As the Welsh Government is aware, we have made representations to the Welsh Government regarding online marketplaces and their poor regulation of second hand sales of white goods. The Welsh Government needs to consider the consistency in approach to ensuing safety in Wales, and encourage those people wishing to dispose of their electrical goods, particularly white goods, to transfer them into the care of the local authority but also ensure there is a consistent safety process in place if they are to be re-sold. This will help prevent these items making their way on to highly unregulated online marketplaces.

Supporting prevention and re-use

Aforementioned, the re-use of electrical goods and their re-sale must be consistent across Wales. Presently there is too much localism underway with the sales of electrical goods, and by that we mean local authorities operate WEEE schemes that are different per local authority area. There is also much inconsistency in the approach to safety. These issues must be resolved. For example, most of the local authorities transfer WEEE waste to contractors – but it is unclear how these items are processed and whether they are recycled or resold back to the general public by contractors. There needs to be greater transparency on the processing of WEEE in Wales and individual local authority websites should have this information.
